I hope that this note finds you and your loved ones well. To say that the past year has been challenging would be a gross understatement. From the time that we first learnt about the decision to move the 2020 Annual Meeting to the virtual mode to the recent decision to hold next year's meeting virtually, the members of the TIM Executive Committee have been navigating through a significant period of uncertainty in carrying out their duties towards the division, while attending to their own professional and personal responsibilities. They have worked tirelessly and innovatively to ensure that we support the TIM community during these unprecedented times. I am truly proud of the entire team, and I want to sincerely thank each one of them for their dedication and commitment.

Janet Bercovitz, the 2020 Program Chair, assisted by Stefan Haefliger and Laurina Zhang ably curated an exciting program, based on 762 paper submissions and 66 symposia, and 2,018 review assignments. These were all time high numbers for the TIM Division! The program design included a total of 77 paper sessions. Because of time constraints, 7 of them were delivered synchronously and the rest were delivered asynchronously. Among the live sessions, the TIM Plenary on a very timely topic of Immigration and Innovation, the insightful Distinguished Scholar Keynote by Raghu Garud, and the TIM Conversations session on Cognition and Innovation were attended by hundreds of members. TIM Conversations is a very unique offering by the division so as to have a rich discussion on a specific topic and for authors to receive substantial feedback on their research.

Maryann Feldman, the 2020 PDW Chair, assisted by Elisa Operti, ensured that we give priority to the developmental needs of the doctoral students and junior faculty through the respective consortia and research development workshops that were delivered synchronously during the conference, while creating an innovative forum under the auspices of "Tuesdays and Thursdays with TIM" to deliver five exciting workshops in July and August. My special thanks to Mahka Moeen and Michaël Bikard, co-organizers of the TIM Doctoral Consortium, and to Valentina Tartari and Florenta Teodoridis, co-organizers of the TIM Junior Faculty Consortium, for doing a stellar job in ensuring that the division continues to support its emerging members. During the live business meeting, we celebrated the research excellence of several members by awarding the Best Paper and the Best Dissertation awards. My sincere thanks to Giovanni Valentini and Karin Hoisl for managing a very elaborate award process flawlessly.

Finally, the TIM Division continues to explore new ways to support members. We have been organizing research development workshops, in addition to the ones during the annual conference. These workshops have been very well received, and the last one in May was attended by more than 40 members virtually. To sustain these efforts, I am very pleased to share with you the formation of a new Research Committee, comprising of eight terrific scholars, who would be supporting our members through virtual roundtables and other mentoring interactions. TIM Distinguished Scholar Keynote


TIM Division Chair: Rahul Kapoor



This year, the TIM Division honored Raghu Garud as the 24th TIM Distinguished Scholar. Raghu is a Professor of Management and Organization and the Farrell Chair in Innovation and Entrepreneurship at Pennsylvania State University. During the virtual event to celebrate Raghu's scholarship, several of Raghu's closest collaborators provided a warm and engaging <u>perspective</u> of Raghu as a scholar. This was followed by Raghu delivering an inspiring, stimulating and thought-provoking keynote.

Raghu offered a candid view of his formative years as a TIM scholar, and the importance of the multiple visible and invisible colleges towards his intellectual development. He then offered a rich historical perspective of the three operative terms for TIM—technology, innovation, and management, and how their meanings have evolved over time. He did so by connecting the dots across several of the phenomena that he has studied ranging from innovation in cochlear implants to technology platforms and the sharing economy. He concluded his talk by underscoring the three challenges that the world confronts— COVID 19 pandemic, the rise of Artificial Intelligence, and sustainability, and discussing how TIM scholars can embrace these challenges as opportunities for research and, in so doing, make important contributions to society. Raghu's talk was a showcase for an ideal type of TIM scholarship, one that is rooted in a deep engagement with the phenomenon with an extraordinary level of intellectual curiosity and diversity.



This year's annual TIM Division Business Meeting was the first we had done in virtual format, being a consequence of the virtual format of the annual conference. Rather than the normal buzz of anticipatory conversation of many TIMers in a meeting room, there was the hushed ambience of mute when Division Chair Corey Phelps started the virtual meeting.

Rahul began by giving thanks to our outgoing Past-Chair, Stefano Brusoni, for five years of superb service and leadership. Rahul then moved on to acknowledge the excellent work done by our outgoing Representatives-at-Large: Stefan Haefliger, Mahka Moeen, Valentina Tartari, Keyvan Vakili and Giovanni Valentini. Rahul emphasized that the Reps. are the workhorses of the Division: they organise our developmental workshops and consortiums, administer awards and websites, and help develop the program for our conference (for more information see: http://www.aomtim.org/ourteam).

He then thanked Stefano for managing the election of the new reps. Our incoming Program Chair-Elect, Sonali Shah (University of Illinois at Urbana-Champaign), was introduced and it was explained she would now join the TIM Five-Year Leadership Track, including: Maryann Feldman (Program Chair), Janet Bercovitz (Chair Elect), Rahul Kapoor (New Chair), and Corey Phelps (Past Division Chair). Sonali is being joined by the newly elected Representatives-at-Large: Anna Maria Conti (HEC Lausanne), Rory McDonald (Harvard Business School), Tiona Zuzul (U of Washington), Thomas Klueter (IESE) and Henning Piezunka (INSEAD). The remainder of the TIM team was then introduced. The discussion then turned to our accomplishments over the previous year.

The main accomplishment for 2019-2020 was the first ever TIM Virtual Workshop on May 14-15, 2020. Following on the success of the workshops at ETH Zurich and LaSalle Universitat Ramon Llull, organizers Neva Bojovic (Kedge Business School), Vidya Oruganti (Grenoble Ecole de Management) and Pierpaolo Andriani (Kedge Business School) transformed the event from an in person to virtual format, and hosted 38 young scholars and 9 senior faculty mentors. TIM membership continued to grow and is now at the record level of 3561. This is a 24% change in the past five years, while the AOM only grew 5% as a whole. Indeed, 20% of new AOM members are TIM members!

Rahul outlined the TIM priorities for 2020-21. These build upon those of previous years, including: increasing efforts to welcome and orientate new members, initiating a research committee to organize workshops and other mentoring activities, increasing engagement on TIM division through a variety of online activities, and expanding the geographic reach of the division by experimenting with regional paper development workshops.

The Program Report was then delivered by Janet Bercovitz. Submissions grew marginally to 696, with an acceptance rate of 45% for papers and 61% for symposia, small decreases on the previous years. She noted that 438 of the submissions were from Europe, and, as well as reminding us of the tracks, reminded us of the structure planned for pre-pandemic times—50 regular sessions, 20 conversation sessions, and 7 discussion sessions—as well as all the planning that was done prior to the chaos. She then advised us of the post-covid reality: 7 synchronous and 70 asynchronous paper sessions. The TIM Plenary remained a highlight, with some interesting panellists, and she advised all to attend. Thanks was then given our to our wonderful reviewers; of particular note was our awards to the best reviewers of 2020. Janet also thanked all the people who helped her over the year.

Maryann Feldman then provided an overview of the TIM development programs, and the various TIM reps provided detail of their responsibilities including the PDWs, the Doctoral Consortium, the Junior Faculty Consortium. Of note was the success of the Tuesdays (or Thursday!) with TIM online sessions that took place outside of the main AOM virtual conference program.

The 2020 TIM Junior Faculty Consortium at the online Academy of Management was widely attended and well received. The Consortium was co-organized by Valentina Tartari (CBS) and Florenta Teodoridis (USC). The event brought together 28 junior faculty participants from across four continents and 10 senior scholars from North America and Europe who featured as panellists and mentors.

The event set out to facilitate discussion among junior and more experienced faculty about the drivers of a successful career in Technology Innovation Management. There were lively discussions about the future of TIM research, both from a theoretical perspective and in terms of empirical advances. During the Research Trajectory Exercise, participants discussed their individual professional and research trajectories in small groups with senior faculty mentors with similar interests.

Senior faculty participating in the event included Ashish Arora (Duke), Kristina Dahlin (Oxford), Jeff Furman (BU), Karin Hoisl (Mannheim), Riita Katila (Stanford), Thorsten Grohsjean (Bocconi), Myriam Mariani (Bocconi), Ammon Salter (Bath), Michael Santoro (LeHigh), and Henry Sauermann (ESMT Berlin).

Given the challenging online format, the consortium ran over two days, offering junior faculty from different time zones the opportunity to attend sessions that best suited their schedules. The sessions where similar in content over the two days with different senior faculty sharing their perspectives each day. The Research Trajectory discussion sessions were particularly appreciated, offering an opportunity for participants to share ideas on career development with colleagues and senior faculty mentors, beyond just the discussion of a single paper. Senior faculty (and organizers!) valued the opportunity to share the joys and struggles of their experience and to meet their new colleagues.



2020 Doctoral Consortium Report

We were delighted to have the opportunity to welcome 52 next generation scholars during the TIM division annual Doctoral Student Consortium at the virtual Academy of Management Meetings 2020. The consortium was held on August 7, and involved a range of TIM research-oriented and job market sessions. Of 52 participants, 44% were female, 46% came from North American schools, 39% from European schools, and 15% from Asia and Australia. Thanks to the financial sponsorship of the TIM division and the UNC's Kenan Institute of Private Enterprise, we were also able to provide financial sponsorship for students who required assistance in paying the AOM registration fee.

Prior to the consortium, participants watched a series of video interviews, in which faculty mentors shared their tips and thoughts about various topics relating to the doctoral journey. Please check the TIM division's YouTube channel for the video, and share it with interested doctoral students.

To kick-off the consortium, Riitta Katila of Stanford University delivered a keynote speech reflecting upon her career and discussing firms' challenges when it comes to technology and innovation management. The consortium included presentations by a panel of faculty mentors discussing tips to help student finish their dissertation and find a job from home. In addition, students joined breakout rooms and received individual feedback and mentorship on two dimensions:

- Research pitches: Feedback about their elevator pitch
- Horizon 2025 exercise: Feedback regarding their projected vita and research statement

The consortium also provided multiple networking opportunities, primarily through more or less structured breakout room sessions.





Title: Successful Corporate Entrepreneurship: A Process of Acculturation Into Corporate Logics

Abstract:

Incumbent firms increasingly employ practices derived from the global entrepreneurial community to develop new innovative projects geared toward strategic renewal. Typically, the imported practices and logics differ substantially from traditional corporate logics. While prior literature has described how organizations can effectively blend different institutional logics and proactively use them, we know rather little about how a new professional logic with its own processes and practices can be introduced into a dominant organizational logic with its strong corset of how to create new market opportunities. We study this complicated process within the context of a large engineering and electronics company that has invested in endorsing corporate entrepreneurship to deal with the opportunities and threats of technological change in its industry sector. We find that a successful re-integration of corporate ventures into a business unit depends on the capability for organizational acculturation. Our study makes two central contributions: first, we contribute to the literature on institutional logics by identifying detail mechanisms of such organizational acculturation process, and second, we add to the corporate venturing literature by offering theoretical insights into the question why practices and forms adopted from the entrepreneurial community do not easily result in new business.



Title: Competition and Privacy in Online Markets: Evidence from the Mobile App Industry

Abstract



Policy makers are increasingly concerned about the combination of market power and massive data collection in digital markets. This concern is fueled by the theoretical prediction that more market power causes firms to collect ever more data from their users. We investigate the relationship between market power and data collection empirically. We analyze data about more than 1.5 million mobile applications in several thousand submarkets of Google's Play Store. We observe these data for over two years and combine information on an app's data collection with information about its competitive environment. Our analysis highlights a robust positive relationship between market power and data collection. We find that more data are being collected in concentrated markets, and apps with higher market shares collect more data. This pattern robustly emerges across a series of cross-sectional and panel regressions as well as a series of specifications that exploit exogenous variation.

Title: The Effects of Hierarchy on Learning and Performance in Business Experimentation

Abstract:

Do senior managers help or hurt business experiments? Despite the widespread adoption of business experiments to guide strategic decision-making, we lack a scholarly understanding of what role senior managers play in firm experimentation. Using proprietary data of live business experiments from the widely-used A/B testing platform, Optimizely, this paper estimates the association of management hierarchy with learning from experiments and their performance outcomes across industries and contexts. Our findings suggest that senior management's association is mixed. On the one hand, senior managers' involvement associates with bolder experiments that create more statistically significant learning signals aiding in the exploration of new strategic directions. On the other hand, their involvement associates with less causeand-effect learning that is instrumental to optimization and performance improvements. Our results contribute to a burgeoning literature on experimentation in strategy, while helping articulate limits that organizational design might place on datadriven decision-making. Furthermore, we describe different experimental learning modes in the formation of strategy, offering important implications for how managers can modulate search and performance outcomes.

Title: Government R&D and Private Innovation: Empirical Evidence from the Bayh-Dole Act



Abstract

Performing contract R&D for the government can enhance and certify a firm's competencies, but may impose resource costs. Here, we investigate the net effect of government contract R&D on private-sector innovation. From 1983, President Reagan allowed large businesses to patent inventions arising from R&D financed by the government. Empirically, large businesses increased contract government R&D, and this was associated with less R&D for internal use, but no significant change in R&D for external industry clients. We interpret these results as due to resource re-allocation to contract government R&D outweighing competency enhancement and certification for internal R&D, but not external R&D.

Title: YouTubers balancing the paradox of novelty and conformity

Abstract

The categorical imperative suggests that since the audience devalues offerings that do not fit within a category, producers should follow conventions to gain legitimacy. This poses a paradox of optimal distinctiveness to entrepreneurs driven by novelty. However, the extant research assumes homogeneous audience and crisp boundaries of the categories in which the entrepreneurs operate. We test these assumptions in a context with multiple audiences and fuzzy categories. By analyzing 208,136 videos of 283 YouTubers nominated for the "Streamys" – prestigious awards in online video – and correcting for endogeneity, we find that novelty is less likely to win an award, but is liked more by its regular platform audience. However, the negative evaluations of the jury audience towards novelty are moderate in fuzzier categories while the regular audience likes novelty more in well- defined categories. Further, we find that winning of Streamys gives YouTubers a status- boost to be more novel in the future. Our results inform firms and entrepreneurs about how they can position themselves to augment their value among audiences."




